Regional trainings, unlimited support to applicants (phone, email, zoom), reviews of applications submitted by the LEAs, and administrative support to the Special Education Oversight Committee.

# Programmatic changes since inception (if any):

### 8. Program evaluation or evaluation of major findings:

An application platform will help improve the application for LEAs and OSPI staff. This platform will be launched in the 2023–24 school year.

### 9. Major challenges faced by the program:

Safety Net award determinations are to be distributed to districts in August of each year. To provide districts ample opportunity to apply, there is one initial round for high need individual students with an opportunity for updates and one application round for community impact. Thus, the bulk of the application review work falls in a compressed timeframe of three or four months, rather than spread over the calendar year. This also makes it difficult for LEAs who do not receive the funding until August when many are not available.

Additionally, lack of an application platform makes it more difficult for LEAs to submit their Safety Net applications.

### 10. Future opportunities:

During the 2022–23 school year, staff worked with a contractor to develop an application platform. This platform should alleviate some of the issues that LEA staff have when submitting applications.

### 11. Statutory and/or budget language:

\$481,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2022 and \$481,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2023 are provided solely for additional full-time equivalent staff to support the work of the Safety Net committee and to provide training and support to districts applying for Safety Net awards.

#### 12. Other relevant information:

OSPI Special Education leadership and staff review feedback from the safety net surveys and other input from committee members and school and district partners to explore ways to improve application and approval processes.
